Revolt on the Northern Plain

While the exact nature of the early meetings are debated by historians, there were two meetings in lack adugast in which plans for an uprising against white enslavers were formed and then sanctified through Vodou ritual. The revolt, led initially by Boukman and a small band of insurgents, grew in scale, destroying hundreds of sugar plantations and over 1,000 coffee estates in the first two weeks. By the end of the fall, most of the Northern Plain was destroyed.




